St. Aidan of Lindisfarne (d.651)

The text of "Leave Me Alone With God" is a prayer attributed to Saint Aidan of Lindisfarne (d. 651).

Aidan was a monk and missionary who is credited with restoring Christianity to Northumbria. At that time Northumbria was a kingdom in modern-day northern England and southeastern Scotland. Anglo-Saxon paganism largely was displacing Christianity in that region.

Aidan founded a monastic cathedral on the island of Lindisfarne, also known as Holy Island, just off the Northumbrian coast. He served as first bishop there, traveling tirelessly throughout the area and spreading the Gospel both to the Anglo-Saxon nobility and to the socially disenfranchised.

Lindisfarne is a tidal island, completely surrounded by water at higher tides but connected to the mainland at lower tides. "Leave Me Alone With God" describes this tidal cycle in relation to private prayer and public service. During times of higher tide, when the sea surrounds us and we are separated from the busyness of the world, we pray for the opportunity to meditate alone with God. During times of lower tide, when the waters move away, we pray for the opportunity to reconnect with renewed purpose to the outside world, spreading God's love to others.
